DON RIDES 426 MILES TO A CLUB RECORD

Although official results are not available for a couple of days, Don unofficially clocked up 429 miles as he wended his way, along with the 70 other riders, through Sussex, Hampshire, Surrey and back to Sussex to finish at Effineham.

Don was in fine form over the first 12 hours, covering 235 miles, which is only eight miles below his best for a 12-hour race. But during the early hours of Sunday morning he hit a bad patch and it was not until he reached the final circuit at Effingham that he really regained his early drive.

Four Worthing Excelsior riders started at midday on Saturday but only two completed the course, which proved a real killer in very hot conditions on Saturday afternoon and again on Sunday morning.

Tynesider Alan Robertson had the heads nodding with approval at his economic style, and was managing to hold Cahill to seven minutes with hardly a drop of sweat to be seen on his brow—and what was more here was the Tyne RC third team counter leading his powerful team.

What a wonderful piece of Tyne teamwork it was too; at 150 miles there was only two minutes between them and they were never seriously challenged for their third consecutive championship team win. But big drama was already taking place. John Baines was suffering and creeping with 53-21 for 100 miles, and no explantation to offer—one was only left to surmise that he sorely missed his band of regular supporters who were otherwise engaged with the organizing of the Luton "12" on this very day, an unhappy coincidence for Baines.

Almost at packing point, Baines once more showed that he is made of stern stuff and continued nursing his gigantic and inexplicable "bundle" of which he never did rid himself.

Meanwhile Cahill was leading at 100 miles with 431-41; Buchan, moving beautifully, face wet, and set, 4-35-5; veteran Den Grady Bec CC, a one-time athlete of note with 480-mile ambitions backed up with mammoth winter training miles, 4-37-5; Alan Robertson 4-38-57, tough Wes Clayton 4-40-35; brother Dennis 4-40-26.

At dawn, when a breeze stirred from a warm night's sleep, freshening the tired eyes of rider and helper alike. Buchan was still whirring away with a lead of 50 minutes before the next man struggled into view. So far was he in front that a 17.9-mile detour was closed to the rest of the field in an attempt to bring him back a little ... it helped a bit!
