

Because of the likelihood of the event being messed up by road works lights on the A.24 in the Dial Post area Club events Secretary Tony Palmer had to arrange a different course from the senior event of the previous week. The only alternative available was the usual Washington ten course but with the very hard fight over the Downs to Findon and then back to the top of the climb for the extra five miles. This was hard on the juniors but the four who competed gave their very best and it resulted in one of the closest finishes for some years.

Jason Buckley showing great form lately and with a moral boosting win over Marvin Lucas when they rode the previous week's race, was clearly thinking of adding to his recent trophy collection. Marvin had other ideas. A time check is reputed to have shown Marvin going through ten miles in a short 23 but Jason was never giving up and their times: Marvin 37.22 and Jason 37.58 show clearly how the competition pulled them both out.

Chris Sweet, who frequently demonstrates how strong and determined he is, by being a job to get rid of when he's been caught, has perhaps to try and concentrate more and he will not then find himself with quite the gap that these others open up. Chris was third in 40.15. David Bennett in his first year of racing recorded a creditable 43.41, obviously better than the handicapper expected for he won that award comfortably.

# SUSSEX C.A. AND CLUB 100 MILE CHAMPIONSHIP

We had nine riders and we did very well, but not quite as well as some expected.

The event was again sponsored by the Regency Building Society and was an 'Open'. Favourite was past winner John Woodburn of the Manchester Wheelers and he did not disappoint. Despite the complex and compact nature of the course - an amalgamation of the two local twenty five courses - covered twice-he powered round in 4 hours 6 minutes 18 seconds and was never troubled by the local opposition. Pete Danckwardt had entered and knowing that he has beaten four hours in the past perhaps we expected

too much. He was always going strongly but his somewhat suspect back caused him to stop and lose time and troubled him throughout. Revelation of the whole event was the superb ride from Brighton Mitre's young Peter Davies who was to improve his personal best by 17 minutes to finish with a remarkable 4.17.16, snatching the Sussex championship from big Pete D by 23 seconds. There were also a couple of splendid first ever hundreds with Kevin Spilman taking fourth place overall in 4.25.38 and Steve Curry fifth spot in 4.26.00. So another fine team win for the Club in our Centenary year. And another record for the aggregate of 13.09.17 lopped just 13 seconds off the previous best set in 1983. Bob Withers riding to a schedule of 4.42.00 was up on that for a while but then fell back in the middle stages. He rallied over the final miles to finish in 4.48.29. Mike Mansell, who, most of us would think was much handicapped by dragging a "barra" round the course, nevertheless managed 4.57.16. Mike Poland just kept ahead of Christine Barnett, who was not far away from her club record with her effort of 5.11.24. Mike was just 15 seconds quicker. Reg Searle was another who decided to drag three wheels along hope this peculiar affliction is not infectious - and he ducked inside 6 hours with 5.58.51. Tony Palmer gave it best around halfway for physical reasons, while Colin Miller called it a day after suffering a "blow out" - not sure if that's physical or mechanical FULL RESULT

#### THE CLUB TWO-UPS

The '10' was on the usual Washington course and the '25' was held over the G939 which takes riders from Angmering on the A27 up to Findon via Offington then back to Patching Pond. Then it's down through Angmering to the A259 and east to the Gateway roundabout and finally back to finish, well on the way to Poling on the A27.

Pete Danckwardt and Stuart Gibbs won the ten with 22.28 but the pairing did not seem to be a happy one and they did not ride the '25' This left Mark Flint and Kevin Spilman in the driving seat with 23.04 but there were four others on 23 minutes so it was all going to be down to the '25'.

In fact the three leading teams were to finish in the same order and the first two opened up with their times of 58.33, and 58.47 - pretty quick round this 'round the houses' course.

There was Glenn Nuttall and step-son Tony Nuttall-Smith. Fourteen year old Grant Butler, Jeremy Maddock and another fourteen year old Neil Lambourne. Richard Miller from Storrington joins us and already shows a fair time trialling ability. He was a member of the Farnborough and Camberley a few years ago. Finally we welcome Paul Middleborough an ex Liverpool Mercury rider now trying hard to get fit again before he gets to veteran status. Welcome to the Worthing Excelsior.

YET MORE NEW RECORDS Mike Mansell has got the bit between his teeth now. After his fifty and ten record times, he's given the ten another beating this time reducing his 25.13 to 24.44, leaving many a two wheel struggler in his wake This effort was again on our Washington course, and the date,30th July. Then on Sunday 2nd August it was the Christine Barnett/Andy Smith tandem that smashed the previous 100 mile record out of sight. In the Century R.C. event on the F.1. course near St.Neots they finished in the remarkable time of 4 hours 1 minute and 23 seconds. The previous best set in 1964 was 4.27.52.

IT'S RUMOURED that before the tandem 100 by Andy and Christine. Christine promised to "pull her weight". This offer was turned down. At your size this will not do, she was told. So she pulled twice her weight!

#### CLUB 25MILE CHAMPIONSHIP AND INTER CLUB25

Let's first dispose of the inter club event which sadly, failed to materialise. Supposed to be against the Bognor club with the aggregate of six riders to count, they could only find five entries, and on the morning, admittedly a pretty fowl one, they did not produce one starter. Clearly we shall have to think on the need for continuing this. It has however, given our riders a chance to ride the P922 course from Bognor out to Havant and back which they would only get otherwise from the occasional open event, and it can be a very fast course, given fair weather. On the morning of 19th July the climate was anything but fair. It waspouring with rain, it was cold enough for early March and there was a very strong southerly wind. Of our 24 entries just thirteen started and twelve finished and it was perhaps significant that those most at home in the water, the triathletes, should come out on top. Kevin Spilman was fastest with a time of 1.3.56, beating his friend Steve Curry by just 4 seconds and in third place was Don Lock (Who!) with a time of 1.5.36. (Very creditable Ed.). Don was heard to remark that he probable lost all his time on the other two on the swimming discipline along the Chichester by-pass. His morning was made though when he was told that he had won the handicap. Proving what an excellent handicapper HE was.....

May 28th. and Pete Danckwardt is back in 9th place in the Colchester 25 but with a rather rapid 55.59. He also gets a mention as one of the stars in the following weekends Surrey R.C. event. Pete also shows in second place in the Reading 10 with 21.51. The Rother Valley 25. was won by Andy Smith in 59.50 and Kevin Spilman and Bob Withers are mentioned as his support for the winning team. Christine Barnett gets a deserved mention for fastest lady. The second of our Criteriums gets results space and Ian Leeding and Stuart Gibbs grab a mention. June 4th. And it's headlines "Superb Spilman" as Kevin wins the Southwater Triathlon. Mark Flint 3rd and Steve Curry 4th are also named. We did, of course report fully on that in the last issue. The Hants 25 result shows Pete D. second in 59.45 and Andy Smith 6th with 1.2.15. Among the vets results we spot Ron Foster taking 2nd on standard in the Kent VTTA. At 10 miles big Pete collects a 2nd

behind John Pritchard in the Belle Vue event. In the road race results our criteriums overall results get some coverage.

June 18th and in Yorkshire Steve Curry gets 8th with a 2.7.22 in the Andy Wilson 50. Nice to see a Worthing name in the Sussex division road race

as well, with Ian Leeding getting home in 9th place on that hard Goodwood circuit. At 50 miles, Andy Smith records 2.2.32 in the Wessex event for 10th. On the track Marvin Lucas has two wins as does Nick Pigott in juvenile races at Preston Park. Also Andrew Lock picking up one of the senior races. 25th June and a great return after injury sees Tony Goodsell winning the S.Eastern 25 in 57.46. The Mike and Stuart Gibbs propelled tandem gets home in 6th place in the Reading 25 in 54.12. In the Sussex '50' we have Pete Danckwardt 1st 1.58.19, Andy Smith 3rd, 2.2.9., Kevin Spilman 5th, 2.6.42, Christine Barnett first lady 2.30.13, Ron Foster best vet. on standard and of course, we won the team. Again the club criteriums got a mention but on the road racing scene it was in the Southborough race that we note Ian Leeding home in fourth place. July 2nd. The result of the Clarencourt hides a number of facts which left our quartet in 5th place. Kevin Spilman only rode a few miles and then was taken out by a pothole. Andrew Lock, Stuart Gibbs and Andy Smith, recorded 1.18.36 for the hilly 50km. The S.C.C.U 10 result shows Pete D 2nd in 21.56 and Marvin Lucas as fastest junior in 24.55 The London South heat of the National Schoolboy's 10 shows Marvin heading home the rest in an excellent 23.45. The Farnham R.C. 10 records Stuart Gibbs 6th place in 23.54. July 9th. Andrew Lock gets 6th place in the Central Sussex Hilly 21km. Pete D. wins the Brighton Excel. 25 in 56.37 and in their tandem event Andy Smith and Christine Barnett get 2nd in 55.49 ahead of Mike and Stuart Gibbs 5th in 58.06. Marvin Lucas is named in the Sussex track results but they don't seem to say why. Force of habit perhaps? July 15th - a poor week only Pete D. 3rd in the Clarence 10. But what a time 20.52!

July 22nd is better with Pete D. somehow getting four mentions: The Slough 25 -7th in 53.56,4th in the Addiscombe 10 with 22.05, Winner of the S.C.A.10 in

23.9 and 3rd in the S.C.A.100 in 4.17.39. In that S.C.A.10 we did rather well. Tony Goodsell 2nd in 22.23, Andy Smith 3rd with 22.30, Steve Curry 4th with 23.01, Kevin Spilman 5th with 23.10. Dave Dallimore 9th on 23.58. Christine Barnett picking up the ladies prize with 27.08, Ron Foster amassing a plus of 5.36 to take the veteran's standard Marvin Lucas gained yet another juvenile award with 24.14 and John Poland completed the clean sweep with the junior prize in 24.58. The 100 also showedKevin Spilman 4th in 4.25.38 and Steve Curry 5th with 4.26.00, and recorded that we had won the team award. 29th July: Essex Tandem 10 and we have Mike and Stuart Gibbs home 3rd in 21.56. #### TRI-ING TIMES IN NORFOLK

The big day had arrived at last. After hundreds of lengths of the swimming pool, thousands of miles on the bike and running, and several pounds of pasta consumed the previous evening, we were now ready for the British Long Course Championship at Leziate Park, Kings Lynn. Steve Curry and I had travelled up on Friday night and were joined on Saturday by other Sussex Amphibians Paul Hardcastle, Gary Stenning and Alison and John Schaab.

After the pre-race briefing on Sunday, we set about putting our bikes and equipment on the racks in the transition area. Steve, seeded number ten after his tenth place in 1986, felt out of place putting his bike with all the low profiles/disc wheels of the top sponsored athletes.

Down at the lakeside, we lined up for the start of the 2000metre swim, in water just below 60 F (cold). First out was ex-Olympics swimmer Robin Brew. Hot on his heels at ten and thirteen minutes respectively were Steve and yours truly, suffering from a lack of natural insulation.

On to the bikes and I found myself making up ground on the better swimmers, working my way from about 80th to 32nd place. Steve, meanwhile, was doing the ride of his life, and moved into the top tenby the end of the 56 miles, ridden in a light drizzle and a westerly wind blowing across the Fens. Our team mate John had swum brilliantly and held his tenth place throughout the cycling.

The thirteen miles run followed an out an back course, giving all of us lesser mortals a chance to see European Champion Glen Cook demolishing the rest of the field to win in 3 hours 56 minutes 24 seconds, possibly the fastest time ever for the half ironman distance. Steve ran strongly against tough

opposition to finish seventh overall in 4 hours 21 minutes. John although suffering, held on to finish eleventh in 4.25. Meanwhile, I began to feel warm for the first time since exiting the water, and tried to make up for lost timeby moving up to 14th place, 4.28 total time. Our other team members Paul and Gary put in great efforts to record 4.48 and 5.04, while Alison Schaab took a brilliant 7th place in the ladies race with 5.10.

As more people finished we realised that we had a good chance in the team competition, with many of the large sponsored clubs not producing the results expected, and a few notable DNF's. When all the times were added up (some time later) we found that we had clinched it: National Team Champions for 1987! # THE TRACK

The Preston Park track season has ended for another year, and, bearing in mind that Worthing Excelsior's participation was very limited, I suppose we didn't do too badly. The highlights were in the British Cycling Federation Sussex Division Championships, where Marvin Lucas won the schoolboy sprint title and Nick Pigott came home with the bronze, and at senior level, Andrew Lock snatched a couple of third places in the sprint and in the 20kilometre points race.

Paul West was our most consistent and regular performer, he was always in the action, and in the Sussex Cycle Racing League points championship was great at collecting points for places although seldom able to make the top spot. Andrew Lock, who was present at only about two thirds of the meetings collected a number of wins and just pipped Paul in the Senior Points competition scoring 30 for seventh place to Paul's 28 for ninth position. Our only other scoring rider at the senior level was Ian Leeding who notched up six points to finish twenty first.

The aggregate for the Club of sixty four points gave us third place in the team classification behind the Regent who amassed 213 and Central Sussex with 102.

It's worth noting though that the Regent had seven counting riders including Vernon Smith who ran away with the individual championship with 95 points. The Central Sussex had five scoring riders with second on individual classification, Colin Tamon, taking sixty.

In the schoolboy's competion Marvin Lucas headed the table with forty points just clear of Andrew Blakeley of Brighton Excelsion second with thirty four. Nick Pigott, scored six points and finished in sixth place in this his first full season.

#### SUSSEX C.A. 25 MILE INDIVIDUAL CHAMPIONSHIP

There always seems to be just one too good for our best in this championship and this year was no exception. We had high hopes that Pete Danckwardt could win this with the form that he has produced during the season. Perhaps it was too late in the season for him and perhaps the late change of course to the 'round the houses' Angmering route did not suit his style, but he would have needed to have been at his very best on the morning of Sunday 20th September to have beaten Steve Dennis of East Grinstead who ripped round in what must surely have been a record for course of 56 minutes 44 seconds. Pete was second with 58 minutes 19 seconds and the Sussex C.A.1987 B.A.R. champion Peter Davies of Brighton Mitre was third with 59.37 just keeping our Andy Smith out of the medals; Andy finishing fourth in 59.39. # THE CENTENARY RIDES

# 100 + 21st June 1987

There were no medals to be won, and I doubt whether many of the riders really had much thought of the one hundred years that they were celebrating. While I shall record the names of those who participated it is no more than an idle thought as to whether

or not this will be read in 100 years from now. It was enough to be out on the bikes with a good day's cycling ahead of us. It was to be a day's cycling, planned, as is essential, around the requirements of good sustenance, good scenery, and good friends, and enjoyed with the bonus of perfect weather in a not so brilliant summer.

Dave Hudson knows the lanes in this part of the world as well as anyone in our Club and we were soon into them, first in the Slindon, Eartham area north of the A.27, and then south of that arterial divider, as we worked our way to the elevenses stop in the Chichester Yacht Basin.

I should explain that Dave had decreed that there should be three q roups - well it seemed like a good idea to have more time for some than others and it worked well. Roger Smallman lead away at 7 a.m. with a party of eight. As it is, of course, Centenary Year we thought we really ought to put on a celebratory road race - and this sort of grew into the "Centenary Evening Criterium Series" held on Monday evenings in May and June, four races for 1st 2nd and 3rd Cat. riders That was the easy bit, deciding dates and categories, ALL we had to do now was to find a suitable circuit, changing rooms etc., etc.

A lot of research went into the course, especially from the safety point of view - the result was a four and a bit mile circuit up at Ashington, with a nice little

hill, some flat bits and some drags - all to be covered eight times - 38 miles or thereabouts. The hope was that it would provide all the ingredients for an interesting series, both for riders and spectators - all we needed was a good entry - and decent weather.

At this point may I say that after my last article bemoaning the difficulty in getting support for marshalling and tea making, the response from the club was very good, particularly in view of the need to be at Ashington before 7 o'clock in order to work out who was marshalling where. We'd got it down to an art by the third event - peopleautomatically marshalled at the same places - but the first race on the 11th May was a bit fraught from the organisers point of view.

A quick tour of the course just before the start showed everyone in place. Don Lock was on the corner of The Hollow, leading to the Quarry Hill. Halfway up the hill timekeeper Ray Douglass stood poised beside the lap board, while on the crucial left-hander on to the A283 a flourescent clad Dave Hudson was rehearsing his "They shall not pass" stance for the eastbound traffic. The other two corners were manned by equally unperturbed, Mike Gibbs and Bob Withers, all parked cars were off the circuit, as promised by the residents, and we were ready to go.

We had a pretty good field - not large but good quality, with a useful number of first category riders and most local clubs represented.

The traffic on the A24 was, as expected light and we started on time - the only snag was the weather- dark, overcast and drizzly.

Out of the gloom, at about half distance emerged a useful working group. Mike Coyle (V.C.Etoile), three G.S.Stella riders, Gordon McMenemy, Mark Jones and Tim Bullen and two St.Raphaelmen, Paul Rogers and Kevin Noble.On the next lap this group was reduced to Mike Coyle, McMenemy and Jones - Noble was hovering between this trio and the bunch Paul Rogers and Tim Bullen having been gently advised by the commisaire to retire, after indulging in an animated debate over each others work rateand head gear.

At the end of the race Mike Coyle powered to a deserved win over the G.S.Stella duo, with the rest of the field emerging from the gathering gloom over the next ten minutes. Stuart Gibbs and Trevor Leeding finished for the home teamand thus went forward to the next event with a chance still of an overall

prize.

After that, the remaining events were very tactical - the leading three on general classification watching each other and allowing others to go for individual

glory.

The second race was won by David Wood, (St.Raphael) with Steve Blackmore second for East Grinstead and Mark Markowski (Hastings) third. Ian Leeding finished tenth in this one, brother Trevor though, punctured in both legs and retired, blowing his chance overall. Stu Gibbs, John Lucas and Robert Downham all finished, the weather was awful the marshalling was complimented upon and I was very grateful for the hot cup of teathrust into my hands by Sheila Lucas and company.

Flaming June's two races were a continuation of the theme, both as to tactics and weatherwise. Mark Markowski won the third event from Steve Blackmore with Tim Bullen

third, followed at 30 seconds by a bunch of 18 riders headed by Kevin Noble and containing all the main protagonists. Worthing packed four into this bunch - Ian - just heading Trevor, John Lucas and Stu in the sprint.

The fourth race was a Hastings benefit with Mark Markowski winning from brother Martin and with Andy Hillman fifth. Mark also won three of the four primes generously donated by Mike Gibbs, the fourth going to Oly Accola of the Southdown Velo.

Twenty five riders finished this one, including seven Worthing men. John Lucas, Ian and Trevor Leeding, Andy Lock (got one right at last) Stu Gibbs, six minutes adrift after puncturing and borrowing Paul West's bike (ought to get a medal for that alone), Ian Stainer and Robert Downham.

All in all not a bad series then. The fields got bigger as the events went on. We had more spectators, better and better marshalling and awful weather. We also learnt a few things for a series next year(Centenary plus One)

For the record; the final result was a tactical win for Mike Coyle, who covered the approximate 150 miles in 5 hours 28 minutes 37 seconds. Second was Gordon Mcmenemy third Mark Jones and fourth Mike Rice of the De Laune. Rice was the best placed third category rider. Our own Stuart Gibbs was fifth

# THE OPEN HARDRIDERS 27th Sept.1987

The third running of this event did not have the financial support of previous sponsors and the Club is very grateful to Richard Pigott's Company, Clanic Press for stepping in, and, as they say, picking up the tab. The hill climb event, within the event, also lost it's previous support, and in this case it was a generous donation from Club President Ray Douglass that saved the day.

Andrew Lock's promotion also had to contend with the problems caused by the fact that the Houghton Bridge road was not available. The new course which was devised started west of Pulborough and went south to Bury, which provided the climb, and then continued down the A.29 to Slindon before cutting through to the A.27 (more road works to be avoided). Riders could briefly enjoy a small section of the G938 course back to Arundel, but then had to make the ascent to Whiteways. The thought that from the top of Bury it was now all down hill was, however, to double the agony of many because the course had some nasty smaller hills in the last few miles. These 'bumps' were to catch out quite a number. After returning through the start point riders had to go left over the new Stopham Bridge and tackle the climb up towards Fittleworth, and then as they headed south out of that village there was just one more which caused anguish in the last mile. Generally the new course was welcomed with many saying that they felt it was safer. It may be retained for 1988, although Ray Douglass has mention another devilish variation if we can use the new roundabout at Fontwell.

The entry was 102 and this included some

star riders; 12 hour record holder Glen Longland, 24 hour champion Ian Dow, Cliff Dent, Steve Marchant, Paul Daniels, John Patston, ex National B.A.R.winner Bob Porter and our own Pete Danckwardt, to name but a few.

The climb of Bury Hill came after just 4 miles and although they may not have got really warmed upat least they had a flying start. Three riders beat 4 minutes for the estimated 14 miles and it's not surprising that Steve Marchant of the 34th Nomads who was second in the National Hill Climb Championship, was the fastest. His time, well clear of the rest, was 3 minutes 39 seconds. It is interesting to compare this with Mike Mansell's club record for the same hill, but with a standing start, of 3 minutes 36 seconds. Next fastest was Glen Longland of the Antelope who made the ascent in 3.56 while veteran John Goodrum of the Catford made third place with 3.59 picking up the special veteran's prize in addition. Other fast climbs included; Cliff Dent 4.00, Paul Daniels and Steve Dennis 4.04 and Mike Mansell 4.05.

From observations at the top of Bury at approximately 5 and 15 miles I noted the following as showing speed and power and as likely contenders: Longland, Marchant, Dent, Dennis Danckwardt, Mansell Dow, Coyle V.C.Etoile and Tamon and Moore of Central Sussex. The Central Sussex had won the team award before and with Lipscombe they had looked to be the main danger to

ourselves from the start.

before the riders, Roger Smallman with his superb finish sheet mounted high on the stage, was able to get on with all the results and calculations very quickly.

We were soon able to see that Longland had ridden round this very hilly 25.4 miles in 1 hour 3 minutes 6 seconds at an average speed of 24.153 m.p.h. and had beaten Steve Marchant by just 7 seconds, with Cliff Dent only another 11 seconds back in third spot. Best placed Sussex rider was East Grinstead's Steve Dennis 4th in 1.4.04 and from Worthing Pete Danckwardt (told me he can't ride hills) was 5th in 1.5.16.

The team event has been based on the "best third man basis and the Central were to beat us again with an outstanding piece of team packing. Their fastest was Colin Tamon , 13th in 1.7.41 and Paul Lipscombe with exactly the same time, and next they had Gary Moore on 1.7.44 . On aggregate we would have beaten them for both Pete and Mike Mansell 1.6.47 were faster and our third counter was Kevin Spilman 24th on 1.9.39 but on this method we were going to have to settle for second once again. Sussex teams were dominant in this section, for East Grinstead finished third.

There was a good atmosphere in the headquarters in Pulborough Village Hall and it was nice that all the prize winners had hung on to receive their awards. Our super tea ladies, Carol Stanbridge, Jean Smallman, Carol West and Maureen Lock worked overtime and there was a raffle to bring a good morning's sport to an end. How long though will Andrew be able to go on providing such perfect weather - it was smashing for rider and supporter alike. Perhaps the best postscript to the event

came from Ian Dow who took the trouble to write to Andrew after the event and to say "many thanks for a really excellent hilly event" .I particularly liked the last remarks in his letter though, " I look forward to having a go again next year, and with luck I will enjoy it a bit less and go a bit faster!"

The race did incorporate our own Hardriders championship and it was good that everyone had bothered to enter this as well. The full Club result is as follows:-

Edgar Henson.

Edgar Henson was an Excelsior member in the very early part of this century, a previous member of the West Tarring C.C. Born in 1864, he might just have remembered the "Boneshaker", but his formative years were also those of the high bicycle. He had his own haulage business in Tarring, and like Sam Clark, was a parish councillor. Both of these could only have been part-time occupations, for his obsession was mile-eating.

He often led the "Potterers' C.C." and other Excelsior fast men on a Sunday "ramble"; for example, to Storrington, Pulborough, Fittleworth, Midhurst, Petersfied, Horndean Cheriton, Tichbourne, Bishop's Waltham, Fareham, Cosham, Emsworth, and Chichester, finally meeting the rest of the club at Arundel. This sort of thing, coupled with running and cycling on the track, kept him incredibly fit.

Edgar was pretty quick-witted too. Now it can be told that during George Olley's 1,000 mile record ride, Edgar's front lamp blew out, and he was promptly pursued by the constabulary, who were taking a professional interest. Nipping down a side lane, he quickly re-lit the errant lamp and pottered nonchalantly back towards the sweating posse—"Yes constable, he's gone down that way, nearly knocked me off!"

Edgar won numerous Excelsior standard medals, and again like Sam Clark, was a good performer well into his veteran years, when he could still produce club road records, and

was fast enough to pick up track prizes. Shortly after the lamp incident, he "borrowed" one of Olley's 1,000 mile record bikes, and took the S.R.R.A Worthing to Hastings and back record in 5 hours 59 minutes, ripping 1 hour 16 minutes off a record which had stood since 1892.

Edgar was fit - all this happened in his forty-third year!
