ROUND THE ISLAND -Through Friends

When member Keith Dodman retired and indicated that he was thinking of a long 'Tour de Great Britain' (and Eire) we asked him for a report for the 'Worthing Wheel'. We know Keith of old, not only is he a long distance rider, he's also a long distance writer and we have extracted just the 'cycling' from his report and that's impressive enough.

If we list, very sparsely, some of the places visited in order you can look at it on a map –(Atlas of GB & I) and you will see his route, largely dictated by where his friends and relations have got to. Bath – Leominster – Birkenhead – (ferry) – Dublin – Carrick on Suir (Sean Kelly country) – Killarney – Ring of Kerry – Galway – Armagh – Belfast - (ferry) – Stranraer – Glasgow – Edinburgh – Newcastle – Bishop Auckland – Leeds – Lincoln – Kings Lynn – Norwich – Biggleswade – Newbury – Home.

Took 41 days and covered just over 2000 miles. A number of Days were spent with his friends when little or no cycling was done. Average miles counting cycling days only would appear to be about

60 with a highest of 130. Apart from the 'free' digs he 'B & B'd' at anything from €30 to a daunting £69 for accommodation only. The breakfast it seems would have cost another £49! Avoid Newbury!

Unfortunately my friend's gears broke at Warminghurst, a quick phone call and his wife rescued him.

I booked the village hall at Washington, filled in all the forms, by the end of September deadline, sent them to Audax UK for approval and to include the ride in their calendar of events. This calendar is given to the CTC, 'Cycling Weekly' and other cycling magazines. So all is well.

I had a phone call in November to say that the village hall had closed for refurbishment. Did I panic? Yes I did. Found another hall at Ashington. Alan Matthews and Tony Palmer came up with suggestions for the necessary route amendment.

I drove round the route in the car one evening in the dark. It is not the easiest job calculating miles to kilometres. I then contacted Audax UK about the change of route. I had to submit new paperwork

but their calendar would show it started and finished at Washington.

Entries were submitted before the new route was finalised, building up to a rush at the end of January. A flyer and map was sent with each entry showing the new HQ. I drove round again two days before the event to check that signposts were still there, for any road works or hazards. Saw a couple of deer and a fox en route.

12th February 2005 was a clear but blustery day. 66 cyclists departed at 09.00. 64 returned having completed the route, (one had to get home to baby-sit the kids whilst his wife went to work, and the other packed quite early).

On the flyer sent with the routesheets to each cyclist was a note asking them not to wear cycling shoes in the hall. At the finish someone said it looked like a Mosque, all the shoes neatly lined up – Well done cyclists.

My thanks go to those that helped on the event. Eve and Ron Bardouleau, Mike Poland and Tony Palmer at the start. Dave 'El Supremo' Hudson, Tony Palmer and his brother at the first control, Paul Toppin at the second control and Jean and Roger Smallman and Chris Beckingham at the finish.
