## Worthing Excelsior Cycling Club



WORTHING EXCELSIOR Cycling Club are reaping the rewards for Great Britain's success in the Olympic Games in Beijing earlier this year.

Britain won 14 medals in cycling events at the games, and Excelsior's membership has now risen to more than 100, which includes a number of younger members, and is at its highest since the 1960s.

Worthing life vice-president and social secretary Don Lock

said: "The Olympics have had a great effect on our membership.

"Our club run every Sunday, which is the backbone of the club, had gone down to just five or six members but now it's up to 20-or-so again.

"When there's a group all in club colours, it looks good, it shows the club name and gets respect.

"We've enjoyed a tremendously good year. It's been our most successful since the 1960s and the club has a buzz about it.

"We've had a great difficulty in the past recruiting youngsters, but now we've got a number of them, who all know each other.

"In the coming year, they will all be going for Sussex and Southern Counties titles."

This year, Excelsior lifted the Sussex 50-mile team championship title, and the Sussex best all-round team championship.

Mel Roberton, 61, was the Sussex individual champion, the

veteran champion, and the Southern Counties veteran champion, which included riders from London clubs.

The team were also victorious in the Hill Club championship, in which Adrian Rogers, who finished ninth in the National Hill climbing event, was the individual winner.

And, Paul Outhwaite was the Sussex long-distance champion.

Excelsior also broke a club record when 11 of their riders

completed the County 100-mile championship.

# Cyclist 'killed rucker's erro

#### Lorry driver weeps as jury return verdict

A lorry driver accused of killing a cyclist in a road accident wept as he was cleared of causing his death by dangerous

David Wootton, 39, known as John, sobbed in his mother's arms after leaving the dock at Brighton Crown Court.

Wootton, of Farne Close, Hailsham, was instead convicted of careless driving, a less serious charge he offered to plead guilty to before the trial started.

He was fined £200 and banned from driving for one year.

Judge Paul Tain said: "This case falls to be dealt with as a straight forward case of careless driving. The penalty I impose bears no relation to the tragic consequences of the

Wootton was driving a 7.5 tonne lorry on the A24 at Ashington, near Storrrington, when he collided with cyclist Keith Harmer, who later died of his injuries.

The accident happened as the delivery driver overtook the bicycle on the southbound carriageway on the morning of October 30 2007.

Wootton, who worked for HB Ingredients, was on his way to make a delivery to the nearby Wistons industrial estate.

Mr Harmer, of Franklands Close, Worthing, an experienced cyclist who was a member of the Worthing Excelsior Cycling Club, was airlifted to hospital in London but died later that day.

A police investigation concluded Wootton's lorry, which was travelling at about 50mph, had been involved in a collision with the bicycle.

But Wootton, who had the windows of his Mercedes cab closed and the radio playing, said he believed he had safely manoeuvred past the cycle and was unaware he had hit Mr Harmer.

John Marsden-Lynch, defending, said Wootton had shown remorse for what happened. He said: "He is still very shaken by the after affects of the accident. He is full of remorse and has been extremely upset."

He said Wootton, now unemployed, was dismissed from his job after the accident because the company's insurance would not cover him to drive while the police investigation was carried out.

The court heard Wootton has a conviction for using a mobile phone while driving in November 2007 for which he received three penalty points on his licence.

A LORRY driver accused of mowing down a cyclist ran to help the man as he lay dying in the street.

David Wootton was behind the wheel of a 7.5-ton lorry on the A24 at Ashington, near Storrington, when the accident happened on October 30, 2007.

Wootton is accused of hitting the bicycle as he overtook it while he headed south on the dual carriageway.

Experienced cyclist Keith Harmer, 49, of Franklands Close, Worthing, died from his injuries.

Wootton, 38, of Farne Close, Hailsham, denies causing death by dangerous driving.

Brighton Crown Court was told that Wootton, who worked for HB Ingredients, was driving to the Wiston industrial estate to make a delivery when the accident happened at about 10.30am.

Mr Harmer suffered serious injuries and was flown to the Royal London Hospital, where he died later that day.

The court was told that when Wootton spoke to police immediately after the accident he denied there had been any collision.

He is said to have told officers that he had safely overtaken the bicycle but then looked in his mirror and saw a man lying in the road.

He immediately stopped and ran back to the cyclist before dialling 999.

Wootton broke down in tears as he said: "As far as I was aware it was nothing to do with my lorry.'

In a later interview with police he said: "I didn't see anything, I didn't feel anything, I didn't hear anything. Nothing in any shape or form."

But Robin Johnson, prosecuting, said there was overwhelming anythere where the the the there was overwhelming anythere.

He said the HGV had been damaged and police found broken pieces of plastic from the lorry's indicator cover and a front deflector panel in the

An investigation concluded the lorry, which was travelling at about 50mph, had struck the

cyclist from behind.

He said: "The prosecution say this accident was undoubtedly caused by Mr Wootton's driving and that accident caused Mr Harmer's death.

'He simply was not looking where he was going."

The trial continues.

## Tragic cyclist's gears stuck

CYCLIST Durrington died in a tragic accident because of a problem with his bike's gears, an inquest heard.

Nicholas Attaway, 57, a postman from Sunningdale Road, was out riding with a group of friends when he fell in front of an oncoming van.

The inquest at Horsham Magistrates' Court on Tuesday heard how Mr Attaway died at the scene of the accident on July 27 last year, Southwater, near Horsham.

David Dean, who was driving the Vauxhall Combi van, told the inquest he and his wife

had been on their way to Amberley and decided to take the route across country.

Mr Dean said he driving between 30 40mph when he saw a group of eight to 10 riders heading the other way.

He said one of the cyclists "suddenly twitched" and disap-

peared from view. He then felt a bump from the back of the van, stopped and looked back, and saw Mr Attaway lying in the road.

Andrew Gomm who had been riding ahead of Mr Attaway, told the court they were coming to an upward slope when he heard a noise from behind.

"I heard a chain or gear slipping," he said, "because it wasn't connecting with the cogs properly - it makes a crunch-

Mr Gomm said this can cause a problem for the rider, although the chain will normally just click back into place.

The inquest heard how Russell Johnson, a passer-by who is an acting inspector with the Metropolitan Police, tried to resuscitate Mr Attaway until paramedics arrived.

Accident investigator PC Simon Rideout, said: "This tragic incident is the result of Mr Attaway encountering mechanical difficulty and falling to the road surface, unfortunately within the proximity of Mr Dean's vehicle.' He added that Mr Dean had

been driving "probably well below" the speed limit at the time, but had no chance to avoid him.

West Sussex coro-Penelope Schofield recorded a verdict of accidental death and said: "This was clearly a tragic accident and it does appear, from the evidence that I've heard,

that there was nothing anybody could have done to have prevented it."

 Shortly after Mr Attaway's death, his only son Rik paid tribute to his father.

He said: "My dad was the kindest and most generous man. If I was ever in trouble, I could always count on him to help me out.

"He will be sadly missed, especially by me, as he wasn't just a father, he was my best friend."

In the Thursday 10-mile race fifth event, Rodgers won by seven seconds from Wootton in 22-03.







"It is by no means certain she will compete in the Olympics, but she is a very determined girl and given the right equipment, support, training and encouragement we all hope that she makes it.

Lauren, of Offington Drive, has been given free membership of the David Lloyd leisure centre at West Durrington, where she hopes to fine tune her game.

She is currently undergoing rehabilitation at the specialist spinal injuries unit at Stoke Mandeville Hospital, but was allowed home last weekend for the first time since the accident.

At the weekend a team of Worthing ousinessmen cycled from Worthing to Reading FC's ground to raise money for

the Lauren Jones Foundation. The "Wacky Racers" set off from Offington at first light on Saturday and arrived six hours later outside the stadi-

Nigel Reynolds took the 50-and 100-mile cups and Stuart Jago the 12-hour trophy.


Ed Klose won the junior best allrounder and senior hill climb titles.
