#### WHERE DO THEY GO ?

A special Worthing Wheel investigation has been carried out to see where and how all this training is done. We hear so much about it but we believe its all just a lot of talk really. In this issue we include some of our early findings. If you can add to this enquiry please let us knows-

Andy Smith does his training at G.C.R.I. The board at the entrance says 'Ground Crops Research Institute' but reliable information suggests it is more likely 'Grovel Cyclists Rehabilitation Institute' which changes after a period of corrective training to 'Gosh cycling really invigorates'.

How would you like to go to Lands End and back with me, Andy Lock and Keith Dodman he said. Well how would you feel? These blokes are no slouches. The re the sort of people that get picked out at the end of an event. "So that's Keith Dodman. He doesn't look particularly fast does he" or " that must be Andy Lock"as he comes past you after about two minutes of the evening ten. Or " I suppose Paul Toppin's fastest?" as you crane to see the result board at the finish. "Yes" I said. " I'd love to go" Reaching instinctively for another Mars bar. I'd like to be able to relate to you how we covered each mile of the trip. What time we entered Lyme Regis and the colour of the curtains in the digs in Falmouth. Unfortunately I can't do that. Prolonged oxygen starvation (or is it just old age) has made retention of

these things difficult.

It was early on the third day, Easter Saturday, that I struck upon what I thought could be the theme for this tale. We had just freewheeled out of the drive of our digs in Fowey. Our muscles reluctant to get going. We had breakfasted well and won the battle to get Andy's saddlebag strapped to his bike. Turning up the hill away from the town and with the day's sun warming our backs we started westwards once more. Before we had tightened our straps Keith had stopped to read an inscription on a stone by the roadside. The stone records and reminds us of the legend of Tristan and Isolde. I've lost track of all the different places that we stopped at. Every now and then I get a picture, a scene returning to my memory. Four sweating fly speckled cyclists strolling in to the foyer of a small town Hotel for elevenses. Where was it Bodmin, Taunton? Who knows?

I wont forget the mad sprints for the County boundaries. The town signs at elevenses, lunch, afternoon tea and of course the day's destination. Our last overnight stay was Devises. It was here that we met the mighty figure of Angela, come to meet the returning travellers. The journey was

coming to an end. I never thought it would. We indulged in a final evening meal. We drank wine and talked of where we had been. It was my birthday that day and that just seemed to complete it all for me.

If in years to come you see a stone by the road side, perhaps it will say this:— "At this spot the famous hill climber Keith Dodman, got off his bike to walk." Or at a boundary sign for a certain west country town; "The legendary cyclist Paul Toppin won a sprint for this sign in Easter 1984"., and above the door of a pub in Wimborne would be the words; "It was at this pub in 1984 that Andy Lock had to pay £4.80 for midday lunch" Well perhaps the ride wont become one of the great new legends, but I do know that it will be a long time before I enjoy myself as much again. And if one of the famous three comes up to you and says "How do you fancy going to ..... Pack a few Mars bars and go.

Thirty-one year old George started riding his bike seriously in Worthing, Sussex, England, at the age of fourteen.

And as far as Sussex medals are concerned, by the time he came out here he had won 14 championship medals, and was five times track league champion.

In 1975 he moved to France for a year where he spent his time riding as an amateur. "Not working, just riding."

Since he has been here he has won gold medals for South Transvaal track championships, and also a gold for the road title.

Now read on ...

This afternoon, at about 4.30 George will be leaving the cycling business where he works in Main Street Johannesburg, and will be riding the 20km home to Edenvale.

Once there he will be having a big plate of pasta. ("As race food. I eat a lot of pasta.")

After that he will check his bike and then watch television.

Tomorrow morning it will be a ride into work. He will be leaving the business at about 11, because every Saturday afternoon he races.

Tomorrow he will be racing 130km at Bapsfontein. In the evening he will relax.

On Sunday morning he has another race scheduled This time it is the 104km United Century Ride organised by the Cresta Wheelers.

There is a staggered start from 7 to 8 a.m. from the Banbury Cross Tea Gardens in Randburg.

It is a hilly courseand the organisers are offering a pair of beer mugs for the rider who completes the course in less than three hours. "It's quite a challenge," says he. "Do you think you will do it?" asks I. "What a question. But of course. Can't let the lads down."

And if he wasn't racing this Sunday morning,

what would he be doing instead?

Going on a training ride for four to five hours - covering between 100 and 200km.

He will then either spend the evening at home, or ride to his parents home for a meal.

Then it will be on his bike for home.

And here was I thinking that weekends were meant for relaxing. "

SUPERVAN It's rumoured that Dave Hudson's van is to get the new Ford Transit treatment. It will be fitted with a Ford-Cosworth engine giving 590bhp. The acceleration is slightly improved with 0 to 60 in less than 3 seconds and 100 m.p.h. in 6.5.seconds. A demonstration model has lapped Silverstone at an average speed of 109 m.p.h. so Dave is reducing his estimated times to courses as follows: Q10/19 - 30 minutes, E72 - 50 minutes and the Borough- well that will take a little longer. Costings will however be up. Fuel consumption is 6 m.p.g. and we should add that with the enormous engine mounted in the back - sorry - there's no room for bikes.

## CB AND CYCLING

Most bikies have a second hobby to while the hours away when we're not taking our bikes apart and putting them back together again, or just riding them.

My main one is digging through old newspapers and minute books to piece together the Worthing Excelsior's history, which involves sitting at the typewriter in my back room for long periods. Using Schnozzle Durante's theory that your left foot can be keeping time and cracking walnuts

(I gotta eat too!), I'm also a REACT monitor.

"A WHAT?" I hear you cry..... I said "I'm also a REACT monitor". REACT (it stands for Radio Emergency Associated Citizens' Teams) is a nationwide organisation of responsible and public spirited CB radio users, which I got involved with quite by chance. I was listening to channel 9 (which is conventionally reserved for emergency radio traffic only) and was able to help a lady whose husband had collapsed — she didn't have a telephone, and her husband's CB radio was her only link. I telephoned their doctor, who turned out and dealt with the situation. As a result, the local REACT group invited me to join.

Most of the voluntary work we do is quite simply to monitor channel 9, usually on a shift basis. This is no great hardship, as it usually means just having your CB radio switched on to that channel, while you do whatever else you want to - my shift is usually from 8-12 p.m. on Fridays, when I'm doing my research, plus any other evenings when I'm working at the 'tripewriter' If a call comes up, for example a mobile CB user reporting a traffic accident, our task is simply to get the details down quickly and accurately. and pass them to the appropriate emergency service. Most of the time you're listening to nothing, but you don't know what is likely to come up. That's it really - a home based link between the CB user and the emergency services, including the RAC and AA.

The other side of REACT work is the one which

might interest event organisers - the marathon, the vicarage fete, even the more genteel pursuits like bike racing, quite often can be run more smoothly with the aid of radio communications. The milk race, for example, has CB in most of the vehicles(listen to channel 36 when next year's race comes your way), and the Worthing Marathon organisers use Worthing and District REACT for their communications, with radio equipped marshals at key points.

Alan Limbrey had the idea of using radio communications when he ran the Vets' Championship "10" this year; event HQ was Horsham Park, while the finish was out on the Horsham by-pass. I'm not sure whether he was worried about the effect on his veterans of having twelve year olds sprinting past them with bits of paper as they pottered back to Horsham Park, or whether he simply wanted to streamline his results service. Anyway, we put a radio at the turn, one at the finish, and one by the result board, and it worked quite well: generally by the time a rider got back, parked his bike, and got his cuppa, his time, standards as well, were on the board. On top of this, Mid-Downs REACT team were monitoring channel 36 in case of emergencies, a service which happily proved unnecessary. I think Alan was well pleased with our efforts, and bunged us a donation for club funds.

Worthing Excelsior have used radio successfully for four events recently - it's not really that important on the G.938, where the finish and the result board are not too far apart, but if there's

any distance between them, it's quicker and there are the safety aspects of not needing runners between the two points, and of having quick access to the 999 service in case of accident.

If you're running an event, and think that radio would be of help, contact your local REACT team - they'll be happy to help, and all they ask in return is a free cuppa, a mention in the start and result sheets, and if your event has any loot left after paying out all those extravagant prizes that Mr.Ballard complains of, a quid or so towards their team funds.



The start sheet showed that Central had a strong team Paul James, Paul Lipscombe, Colin Tamon, Don Awcock, Adrian Jones and Keith Bulmer.

It also showed that Deacon for Lewes was backed by Simon Barnes, Martin White, Andy Attwood, Matthew Rabbetts and J.Bridger. So that was the opposition.

In the result, no one could match a really superb ride from Tony Deacon who covered the course in 58.02. #### MID SEASON ROAD RACE REPORT

While some of our members were stretching their legs at Eastway(see report in Spring Mag) others spent April Fool's Day in a Surrey League Fifty miler at Ewhurst Green. This was not a successful outing though for Mike Coyle punctured and packed and Richard Knight was to finish well down in 23rd place after having been involved in a crash early on.

One week later we had our own 45 mile road race on the Ashurst circuit for third category and junior riders. Our riders managed to keep in touch with the action and there was a spirited effort in a small break in the closing miles by Stuart Gibbs. When it came to the sprint though there was still a big bunch and not enough road. Paul Toppin was most successful finding a gap and a gallop on the last short climb up to Ashurst and collected fourth place. His first licence points of the year. Andrew Lock was placed 15th and Stuart Gibbs 25th. Yours truly was again left bemoaning the inadequacies of tubulars and D.N.F'd.

14th April gave us our first road win of the season when I won a thirds and vet's event at Eastway (see centre page Ed.). I made a break from the main bunch to try and catch two who were away. This was with about a kilometer to go and when I got up I found I was strong enough to go straight past and win by a few lengths. At the same meeting Jonnie Betteridge started but did not finish the same race. In earlier events Ian Leeding rode well and finished 12th in the schoolboy race, while Bradley Walters was dropped early on in a fast junior race and eventually retired.

April 20th and we were involved in another Surrey League race, this time at Baynards and Richard Knight showed his sprinting ability taking third place from the bunch. I was 13th and Mike Coyle 31st.

The Club's second win of 1984 came on 21st April at Walliswood when Mike Coyle broke away with five miles to go. He held off all attempts from the bunch and won by a clear 20 seconds. The licence points gained put him into a second category status. The first Worthing rider to achieve this since Paul Toppin. Richard Knight was 11th while I dropped out in the last few miles wondering again on the deflation rate of my tubulars.

Ian Leeding continued to gain experience riding a schoolboy race at Eastway and finishing 13th in the bunch. In the thirds and juniors race I came home 35th with Bradley staying with the fast group for 15laps.

Still going for the most punctures in a season record I D.N.F'd in a thirds and junior race at West Malling on 5th May.

The puncture habit was passed the following day to comeback man John Lucas in his first road race outing in the Redhill event. Richard

Knight finished 10th.

On 13th May I was dropped in the Central Sussex road race after about 45 miles, while Mike Coyle managed a creditable 10th in the Southern Velo Kermesse at Fernhurst. Richard Knight and Graham Tooley both withdrew after being lapped.

Paul Toppin was in good form on 20th May riding the Surrey League event at Newdigate. He attacked from the bunch with twenty miles to go and came within 30 seconds of catching a two man break. He finished a clear third and picked up some more category points. Richard Knight was 18th and I was just two more places back. In the afternoon event for second and third cats. Mike Coyle finished 20th after a puncture and a lone chase for some 60 miles.

Seven days later and Richard Knight gets some points with a third in the Surrey League race at Crowhurst. I was 11th. Paul Toppin punctured - so it's not only me!

On 17th June Ian Leeding got his best placing so far finishing fifth of a six man break in an Eastway schoolboy event.

At Newdigate again on 17th June and Richard Knight was 10th, while I trailed home 28th and not feeling well.

The Club's third win and the second for Mike Coyle came ina second and third cat. Surrey League race at Lingfield on 8th July when he finished a minute clear of a break which he had caught and then dropped. Great stuff! Richard Knight was 10th in the morning's thirds only.

Also on 8th July Bradley hung in there to finish 15th in a bunch sprint at Eastway.

Our own promotion on 14th July was a disaster as far as our riders were concerned. We had four starters Stuart Gibbs, Paul Toppin, John Lucas and myself and all D.N.F'd. The vital break with all the big guns in it was missed and that was it. Perhaps Mike Coyle could have shown us how it's done but he was riding his first outing at Eastway where he finished 15th in the main senior race.

Win number four and the first for Richard Knight came on 15th July in the Surrey League event at Crowhurst. The three man break was Richard, Paul Toppin and Ulric Drake or the South Eastern. Paul was the one without the sprint and Richard was the one with it. So first and third - tremendous. So as I conclude this report from the comfort of the bunch - excuse the writing but I'm being jostled a bit on the hills, I leave you with the thought that we now have three second category riders with Mike Coyle, Paul Toppin and Richard Knight, but they'll never catch me for punctures.
