CLUB 100 Mile CHAMPIONSHIP

We haven't had a championship for a few years with the popularity of the longer distances waning, so it was great to learn that this year we had three riders. The Club event has usually been incorporated in the Sussex Championship and for 2007 that was run in conjunction with the Southern Counties promotion. This seems to have been successful with a well run event and seventy entries.

Our three were all debutantes at the distance, indeed two – Adrian Rodgers and Mark Bernhardt had yet to ride a '50'! Nathan Gale did at least have two or three rides at half distance under his belt.

The morning dawned wet as have so many mornings this summer, but the forecast was for early improvement and for once they were right. Mark off early at No 6 had it damp to begin with but it dried up and the wind – northerly- was not too bad.

The course from Buck Barn goes out to Clemsfold on the Guildford road then out to Crawley and back to Southwater. This circuit is then repeated, before riders head south to Buck Barn and through the traffic lights (Mark says he had to wait about 10 minutes!!) out to Cowfold and Bolney. Retracing to Cowfold they go down to Henfield and back to Buck Barn. This time there's the slip road (no lights) and they come south along the A24 to Ashington. Here they use the 10m turn roundabout and go back north as far as Dial Post (89 miles covered as they go past the event HQ). Finally they have to ride the old Sussex 12 hour circuit out through Coolham, Dan Hill and Ashington to finish at Dial Post.

Our observer was principally trying to help Mark so had to stay close to his ride, but he saw Adrian going well at about 37 miles and again around 80 miles. Nathan was hooted at, and responded by sitting up and waving, so obviously OK, but perhaps not going quite as well as his '2.13.00' 50 suggested he could.

The times recorded with club handicapping are shown below. All of these are good first time performances and all can knock 15 minutes from these times next year. Given a less arduous course, this one is definitely lumpy, that could be 20 minutes. A good helper and a schedule to ride to would also bring them further up the result table. Mark found his 5 hour schedule useful and, after a slow start, encouraging. It kept him focussed when the hard stretches and fatigue set in, and he was sprinting to take more time out of the schedule in the last few miles.

Congratulations to all three. Now get those 50's in and we've got a Best All Rounder Championship again

ENTRY FORMS

Mel Roberton, who has to deal with the entry forms for club events, and for our open promotion, plus the handicapper have thought that it might be an idea, especially for newer members, if we published a correctly completed form. OK it is not quite so important for club events as long as you've signed the declaration it will probably be accepted, although some details as to past performances would be helpful to the handicapper. With entries for Association or open events though, it does become much more important and it does make it so much easier for the promoters.

The completed form that we include in this issue is obviously fictitious as to dates, events, times and ages but a few points arise :-

- (1) 'District' is the district of Cycling Time Trials in which this club resides:- it is London South.
- (2) If you have an E-mail facility then you can opt to have start and result sheets sent to you in that manner
- (3) Not very often, but just occasionally open events are over subscribed. Police/Cycling Time Trials agree maximum fields, usually 120, so they would normally select the fastest and if you are unlikely to be included you can tick the 'Yes' box and agree to be a reserve. Sometimes you will be informed before the day that -No 29 is unable to ride and will be offered his place, other times you simply arrive at the event and if a rider has not appeared you can slot in. There's usually a few 'D.N.S' (Did not start)
- (4) If you are under 18 then the back of the form has to be signed by a parent or guardian.
- (5) If you are over 40, whether you are a member of the Veteran's Time Trial Association or not, you are eligible for veteran awards. There are 'standard' times for all 'standard' distances 10,25,30,50,100 etc and these are increased at each birthday. So if you beat your standard you achieve a 'plus' and if your 'plus' is the biggest you win. Mel Roberton or our Ed can let you have a copy of those standard times if you have not got one. Membership of the VTTA is very cheap and there is a complete nationwide series of events and championships plus a medals award system well worth looking into.
- (6) You will see at the head of the form reference to 'Handbook'. This is published annually by Cycling Time Trials. We order them in January and they are usually received by mid February or you can order them on-line. If you want to know anything about time trialling, you need this book. Every event and its details are listed together with a great deal of other information rules, regulations, courses, champions, championships and records. It costs about £5 and is a must have. (See Karl Roberton to ensure he puts your name on the list)

This long running association of clubs (founded in 1921) which puts on a full programme of time trials every year, together with related competitions for all categories, is in imminent danger of folding.

For some time there has been difficulty in finding event promoters and members to serve on the managing committee, and now, very long standing and important officers are giving notice that they will not be prepared to continue after this year. Chairman Mark Jones and Treasurer Heather Jones have served the Association well for a number of years, but now want to hand those offices to other hands. At the same time long serving Secretary Roy Fairchild (more into his seventies than he would want us to publish) feels that younger people must come forward to serve, to put something back into the sport.

If the Association is to continue in 2008 there must be an early and positive response to this situation. The Annual General Meeting is in November and should there be no volunteers from the membership of its 20+ clubs then racing in this area is going to be decimated. Such is the seriousness that the existing officials have stated their willingness to remain in office only to "oversee the disbandment"

Can you help? Those resigning will be pleased to act as 'mentors' for the new appointees to assist a smooth transition.

Anyway, it looked for a while as if this might be a non-event with only two riders entered by the Tuesday (which is really the club's closing date) however a bit of chasing pulled in two more and with a couple of guest rides we had a race.

It was a super morning, very little wind and a nice fresh air – not too hot or too cold. The riders were to take full advantage and produced some excellent times.

We think that Mel Roberton's winning time of 1.7.38 is in fact a club record for this course. We've searched back through the records for 12 years and

the best we have found was in 1995 when superstar Nick Lelliott recorded 1.08.12. Whatever, twenty five and a half miles including the climbs up Bury and later from Arundel back to Whiteways in this time is an excellent effort. Mel's "Yes, pleased with that, it's a personal" was typically modest.

Adrian Rodgers warming up for the forthcoming Hill Climbs including the National at Cheddar Gorge, welcomed the opportunity to stretch his legs over these 'minor' ascents and came home second in 1.10.06 to knock more than 5 minutes off his 2005 effort and take yet another handicap award.

Debutants to the Hardriders were the Mark(x) 'Brothers' with Newnham catching Bernhardt to give very respectable times of 1.15.48 and 1.16.59 respectively.

Those honeymoons? Oh yes, Karl Roberton and Lyndsay and Nathan Gale and Stephanie. We wish them well ---- wonder whether times will slow or improve!

SOUTHERN SPORTIVE

My Dad and me did this ride on 16th September. It was 72km and had about 700m of climbing. At the beginning of the ride it was reasonably flat with just the occasional short steep hill. We started near the back because we arrived late so we weren't in a pack until the later stages.

We started off quite slowly so that we didn't exhaust ourselves for the second half. But we made sure that we went as fast as we could on the long straights so eventually, we caught up with a few stragglers who we overtook with ease.

When we were going up the final hill before the checkpoint, we were gradually catching up with the people in front of us, however, we stopped for just too long eating fruit so most of them got back in front of us. It took half an hour, but we caught them back up again and we followed an old man in his slip stream and there was a younger man behind me. The younger man broke away on one of the down hills but me, Dad and the old man stayed together until the end of the race. It was great fun with an extra person, it really gave me the energy to keep going knowing that if a 71 year old man could finish, then so could I. (71 is a good age, and not so much of the 'old man'! Ed)

At the end of the ride, me and Dad went to get our times and we found it was 3 hours and 2 minutes which was only minutes off the silver medal! I was very happy with the time, it was a very challenging ride at points, but I really enjoyed doing it.

ROCCO SEPE - ÉTAPE 2007

4400m of vertical hell! That's the climbing in this year's Étape du Tour, in a stage of 200km from Foix to Loudenvielle. 8500 entered – only 4300 finished.

Alarms were set for 4a.m, our hosts had promised us pasta for breakfast and duly obliged – you have to be made of stern stuff to put away a bowl of spaghetti at that hour, a dollop of honey helped it down.

All nervous energy at the start, we were glad when Greg LeMond set us on our way.

The first part was supposed to be the easiest – but halfway down the Col de Portet d'Aspet shouts of 'Whoooa' went up and we slowed to avoid one chap on the ground who'd got it wrong and was lying grazed and bloodied. The memorial to Fabio Casartelli, who died on this descent was another poignant reminder of the dangers that can lurk on the sweeping and super fast downhill.

We knew the climbs were going to be tough. Five in all, between 10 and 20km long, with the worst saved 'til last when legs were already starting to run on low. What no one was expecting was melting tarmac on the toughest, Port de Bales! Just as the gradient started to kick up, we rounded a bend to find a glistening, sticky surface. I'm sure it was even flowing down the hill at one point, but that may have been oxygen deficiency playing tricks with my mind!

Both the last 2 climbs of Port de Bales and Col de Peyresourde were murder, at around 1½ hours to climb each one, grinding up in bottom gear became totally mind over matter. It was no good thinking about the exhaustion or the pain, neither was it wise to think about stopping for a breather – a friend told me that if you stopped once, the next stop would be easier to make. At the moments of maximum exertion, when legs and lungs were burning, and when each pedal stroke became one monumental effort after another, I found that my mind closed in as if blinkered, so that every part of my body could contribute to the effort.

It was the first time the tour was to use the Port de Bales, the descent was a dirt track that had only just been tarmaced. We'd been warned it was very narrow, very steep and with nothing between you and a sheer drop off the edge. But none of the reports had done justice to what a wonderfully exhilarating descent it was – beautiful, stunning scenery with the lush, Pyrenean mountain tops stretching out for miles beyond.

After the Col du Peyresourde it was downhill to Loudenvielle and the finish. I tried to beat 11 hours, but clocked 11.01 – seven days later Alexander Vinokourov finished in 5.34! As we learnt later, a chemically assisted effort.

The camaraderie was wonderful, there were plenty of opportunities to

strike up a chat with riders from all over the world. At one point I found myself with five other riders on Condors, for a few minutes we were 'TeamCondor', though not quite striking fear into anyone's heart!

What makes the event special? Of course there's the pleasure and privilege of being able to ride on roads closed to traffic. There's the knowledge that you're riding a route only a few days before one of the greatest shows on earth arrives to do the same,. But a very special joy too, is riding through French villages with streets lined with enthusiastic locals shouting their encouragement as the church bells ring out specially to greet us as we pass.

So should you shave your legs for an etape? It's a pressing question, I'm reliably told there is no aerodynamic advantage - it just feels like you're going faster! As I found myself tucked in behind one chap who had a lush, woolly coating on his legs I did wonder if he would disprove this theory in a wind tunnel test!

As we received Rocco's Étape report, we also heard from Club historian John Grant, who had found a report in the Worthing Gazette of 21st Oct 1908 (he's a bit behind with his reading!) - that the Horsham road was to be tarred. The reporter, Dick Turpin (Dick Long) writes 'I am trying to picture it! Will the idea catch on? Or will it be the wheelman, unable to get away from the sticky mess, who will do the catching on?'

NOSTALGIA

The first entry in the current race book is dated 26th February 1983, nearly 25 years ago. Even the type of event is interesting, it was a medium gear 10 mile. This meant that all riders would ride single fixed gear not exceeding 72 inches. Usually this was possible with a 48 tooth chain ring and an 18 tooth rear sprocket. This was on the old style 27 inch wheels. Today those cogs on 700 x 23c wheels/tyres would give you 70.9 inches. The slightly larger 27 inches with slightly bulkier tyres could have seen you slightly over geared and the measurement was carefully checked before you started. Time has lost what distance the bike was allowed to move forward for one careful revolution of the pedals but it would have been marked out on the road and checked. No doubt a mathematician can provide the formula.

Any way back to 26th February 1983 and despite these rigorous requirements we had twelve entrants, and this was the result.

He rode every distance time trial up to 12 hours. He won the Clapshaw 25 mile handicap trophy so many times they had to give it to him and get a new one. He rode tandem with Reg Searle and with Tom Lednor and some of his records remain unbeaten. He was a member of the club team that went all the way up to the Yorkshire 12 hour and came away with the team trophy.

Mike joined Worthing Excelsior at around 15 years of age and was a life member. That his life has now ended leaves a very quiet and subdued clubroom and he will be greatly missed by all his friends.
